Comments: There was a main difficulty I had to deal with. Printing a gradation smoothly turned out to be rather difficult and in the edition one print differs a little bit from the other. The first time I did that or an edition. Beside the uncarved plate for the bokashi I used 2 plates-one for the core color, another for the dark brown parts. The center of the dried blossom had to be darker than the rest- I didn't do a

reduction woodcut. I only put the pigment at the places where the darker color should go. So there is a smooth change between dark brown-very dark brown.
